

## PREPARING CHRISTIAN LEADERS

The Templeton Honors College was founded at Eastern University to meet a need. Intellectually gifted Christian students can easily find their way to any number of highly reputable universities where they are subjected to an education that is at best secular and at worst actively hostile to Christian faith. The Templeton Honors College offers them an alternative, an opportunity to make the training of their minds an integral part of their spiritual lives. It thus takes its place alongside Eastern University's many initiatives and programs for nurturing future Christian leaders in an environment promoting the integration of faith, reason and justice.

Most of us have felt the force of social pressures against such integration, pressures to divorce the life of the mind from the life of Christian faith, worship and service. The students of the Templeton Honors College benefit from the special efforts of faculty to counteract these pressures by introducing them to the intellectual riches of the Christian tradition, with its power to mold our character in the image of Christ.

Students learn from experience that to cultivate their minds is a transforming work of spiritual obedience as well as a deep joy.

Indeed, perhaps the first thing you notice about classes at the Honors College is how much fun everyone is having. The inherent pleasure of learning is amplified by the fact that the classroom is a place of friendship. Students' friendships are strengthened by the bond of common studies, in which all truths point toward a common center in Christ, the beloved. The result is often a palpable level of shared exhilaration.

This atmosphere of friendship is deliberately cultivated from their first week at Eastern, which is not spent on campus, but literally out in the woods, camping in the Adirondacks in New York State. Students' first memories of the Honors College are formed as they help each other set up camp, carry gear, do some demanding hiking, and try to stay dry. By the time they walk into their first class back in St. Davids, they know each other better than they had thought possible. For they have also in this first week begun to form a community of learning as they pray and worship and study Scripture together, led by

faculty and other students who have been on this trip before.

Thus at the Templeton Honors College the cultivation of the life of the mind is not separated from the cultivation of friendship, which is not separated from the cultivation of the life of faith and Christian character. This group of friends find they have many great companions on the way of Christ, as they discover Augustine, Dante, Luther and Flannery O'Connor and they find that their teachers, too, are on the way with them, leading them to demand from themselves a disciplined Christian life, the practice of the virtues and diligence in study.

The life of the mind is fun, but it also serves a purpose beyond itself. Our country and the world need more educated Christianssteeped in the great books of the Christian tradition, enlivened by the fine arts, knowledgeable of God's work in created nature, and pierced by the cry of those who are beset by injustice. In cultivating all these things in its students, Eastern University gives the world a great and necessary gift. In founding the Templeton Honors College nearly ten years ago, the University enriched that gift and to that extent enriched the world.


### **IOHN CHAMBERS '05**

as a way of life at the House, Hartgrove also speaks and writes about discipleship and community. He credits the curriculum of the THC program "for having me read the great thinkers of history and the public intellectuals of our day, and for giving me the necessary background to accurately speak about God's kingdom." With the goals of working for the unity of God's people, praying for the kingdom, and continuing to walk with Jesus, Hartgrove continues to seek education, although this time outside of the classroom. He is currently doing this by working with Ann Atwater, a veteran civil rights leader, to learn about how to organize for social change.

## **CHLOE BROWN '06** Music as Worship

After graduating from Eastern, Chloe Brown thought she had a life plan until things changed completely for her. "I would have liked to continue in my pursuit of a master's in social work but God led me here," said Brown. She's referring to the Christ of the Nation Bible School in Texas where she is in her 3rd year of a program which focuses on worship and technical arts. In addition to her studies, Brown plays the piano and sings for two worship teams. Brown's dream would be to work towards eliminating systemic poverty in America, but she is still grateful for her little detour to Texas. As a THC student she never thought she would be led to where she is today, but she feels the program exposed

her to a lot of things she would not have encountered otherwise. "I'm a well rounded person now," said Brown.

## **AMY GILBERT '04** Dynamic Teaching

Working towards a dual master's and doctorate in psychology at the University of Virginia, THC alumna Amy Gilbert has been busy since graduating from Eastern. With her goal to finish her master's work and her dissertation on the horizon, Gilbert has begun her first teaching position this semester. She hopes to incorporate similar educational practices to those she experienced in the THC program into her own teaching methods and classes, as they have had an impact on how she views education. Gilbert praises THC for how it "emphasized the importance of an educational foundation on broader areas, keeping away from the specific, focused subjects." Instilled with a love for the history of philosophy at THC, she plans to write and continue teaching.

Languages have always been of interest to Angela Stowell, who was a French and history major at Eastern. She plans to travel to Latin America this spring to study Spanish. She has also researched many academic programs in Mexico and Costa Rica and will choose one that she hopes will help her to achieve her goal of becoming fluent in Spanish. After graduating

Merservy, who received a degree in history from Eastern, works for the LIFE program, which is the Linking Income, Food and Environment program affiliated with the Zambian Forestry Department. His primary focus has been helping the Agriculture Department implement new programs, while also being involved with anti-AIDS work. He has served as both a liaison and advocate between his village and the government ministries and NGOs, and has worked on a water sanitation project. His time spent in the THC program provided him with the tools needed to deal with various situations he has encountered in this position. He says, "Often times the ability to take a fresh

approach to a problem, to think critically and creatively about an issue, has been proven to be as helpful to me in my job as any technical knowledge could be. THC helped me immeasurably in developing and refining all those skills." Next year Meservey will transfer to Zambia's capital, Lusaka, to work on the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS relief (PEPFAR). With the goal of working in the international arena, Meservey plans to continue his education with either a master's or a doctorate once he returns to the U.S.

John Jr. and Josephine Templeton, the Templeton Honors College at Eastern University is designed to challenge and prepare academically gifted undergraduate students for leadership and service. It prepares them to be individuals of influence in culture, society and their professions

by providing a holistic program focused on the life of the mind, character formation, and skill development.

John M. Templeton, Jr., M.D. is a long-time member of the Eastern University Board of Trustees and generous benefactor of the University. He is also president of the John Templeton Foundation, and directs all Foundation activities in pursuit of its core mission to serve as a philanthropic catalyst for discovery in areas engaging life's biggest questions in science and philosophy. One of their recent grants was to the study of glossalalia, or speaking in tongues (see story on page 20).

After earning a bachelor of arts degree from Yale University in New Haven, CT, Dr. Templeton earned his medical degree from Harvard Medical School in Boston. He completed his internship and residency in surgery at the Medical College of Virginia in Richmond and subsequently trained in pediatric surgery under Dr. C. Everett Koop at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. After serving two years in the U.S. Navy, he returned to the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia in 1977, where he served on the staff as pediatric surgeon and trauma program director. He also served as professor of pediatric surgery at the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. Templeton was board certified in pediatric surgery and surgical critical care and is a fellow of the American College of Surgeons. He serves as a board member of the American Trauma Society and as president of its Pennsylvania division. He has published numerous papers in medical and professional journals, in addition to two books, A Searcher's Life and Thrift and Generosity: The Joy of Giving.

Born in Capri, Italy, Dr. Josephine (Pina) Templeton came to the U.S. in 1949 with her family, returning to Italy in 1961 to attend medical school. She met her husband during her post-graduate training at the Medical College of Virginia. Dr. Templeton then completed a residency in anesthesiology at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania followed by a fellowship in pediatric anesthesiology and critical care at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia under Dr. John Downes, subsequently working in the same department. She is now retired from the practice of medicine and involved in many philanthropic activities.

## **Tony Campolo Writes Book for Red Letter Christians**

Dr. Tony Campolo, professor emeritus of sociology, has written *Red Letter Christians: A Citizen's Guide to Faith and Politics*, which will be issued by Regal Books in Feb. 2008. Red Letter Christians desire to live out the red letters of Jesus' words in the New Testament. Believing that Jesus is neither a Republican nor a Democrat, these Christians want to transcend partisan politics and concentrate on issues viewed as critical moral and biblical values. Into this arena steps Tony Campolo, Eastern's own powerful evangelist known for his passionate sharing of the radical message of Jesus. In this book, he examines many of the hot-button issues facing evangelicals from the perspective of Jesus' red letter words in the Bible. Topics include the Iraq war, Palestine, the environment, gay rights, gun control, immigration, and economic and government issues.

## Points Not to Himself, but to the Cross

awed whisper. I love to hear him read a psalm or proverb to us with an earnest, hushed wonder at its meaning. The pages of his Bible are dense, heavy with insights and cross-references packed into the margins. And yet, for all his knowledge, he is not afraid to admit his ignorance in the face of mystery. "I don't know," he sometimes tells us. "I've spent 45 years with this question, and this is as far as I've gotten."

Despite these deep questions, Dr. Cary does not let the complex theological arguments we discuss eclipse the purpose of theology. "Some preachers preach only about proofs and starve their congregations," he tells us. "But theology is not about proofs. It's about preaching the Gospel." In his role as a philosopher, Dr. Cary explains intricate proofs to us; in his more crucial role as our teacher, he aims with all of these explanations to point us to Christ. His teaching makes clear that proofs and arguments are never ends in themselves. They proceed from and direct us back toward the Gospel.

A few weeks into the semester, we start studying Peter Berger, a philosopher who ponders why a mother comforts her child by saying, "Everything's okay."

"The mother is affirming order," Dr. Cary explains.
"But why is there an ordered universe? On what basis can the mother tell her child that everything is okay when lots of children in the world are abused and raped and killed? Why isn't the mother lying?"

The class is silent. Dr. Cary continues, "A belief in a just, merciful God justifies the idea that everything is okay. Otherwise this is a lie. Why is it a lie if we don't believe in God?"

Dr. Cary waits, searching for someone who will dare to answer. "Come on, people. Somebody tell me why it isn't a lie that everything is okay." His voice is taking on urgency. "As Christians, we believe in a God who defeats death," he says. "But this is too abstract—we have to tell a story to know this. And please don't just use the word 'God' in your story. Somebody tell me a story to say why it's true that everything is okay." He paces tensely.

My friend Dan risks a simple reply. "Christ died for us on the cross and rose from the dead."

"Yes!" Dr. Cary explodes, nodding with his whole body. "We tell a story and we sing at Easter." He breaks into a hymn with a roaring volume that swallows up the room, "Christ died and is risen again!" If this is not at the center of your faith and your thinking about God, then put it there. Give me Jesus Christ or give me nothing! I don't give a hoot about all this experiential garbage that the churches are teaching nowadays." He slows the tempo of his speech and his voice draws back from its crescendo in sound but not in force. "Julian of Norwich was a wonderful medieval woman who had visions of Jesus in which He said, 'All is well. I will keep My word and all will be well.' Don't be surprised that terrible things happen. This world is a terrible place. That's why Christ died on the cross."

An abrupt rustling of papers and zipping of backpacks signals the end of the class. The students file out. I linger, watching Dr. Cary sit down and thrust his elbows forward on the table, resting his head in his hands.

He turns to me suddenly.

"Allison, was I too hard on people by yelling at them today?"

I remember for a moment the wisdom that the octogenarian pastor emeritus at my church taught his parishioners once. Pastors should never preach at or even to the congregation, he told us. "We preach for them," he said, "for their good."

"No," I answer Dr. Cary. "You weren't yelling at us; you were yelling for us."

After the service is over at our church on Sunday, the congregation funnels out of the sanctuary. The silence gathers as the organ postlude fades. I see Dr. Cary move closer to the front of the church and sit down alone in a pew. He rests his fingers under his chin, apparently in quiet meditation. He gazes beyond the altar, arrayed in its draperies of green and gold, and looks at the carved image of Jesus dying on the cross—stark, severe, and beautiful.

The image of my professor looking at the cross fills me with regard for him. I am tempted to marvel at his deed, his devotion, his character. But he knows that he must decrease and Christ must increase. His contemplation invites me and all his students to follow him in marveling at our Savior. The aim of his teaching and his example is to point not to himself, but to the man on the cross.

## Eastern University Earns Green Power Award from Penn Future

100% of St. Davids campus electricity usage comes from emission-free wind energy

Why would college students vote to voluntarily pay an additional fee to help offset the costs of wind energy? At Eastern, this is just what the students have done. Committed to our core values of faith, reason and justice, Eastern has fulfilled a pledge first made by its students in 2002 to achieve 100% wind energy for its electrical usage. This achievement has earned Eastern University the 2007 Green Power: Turn It On Award from Penn Future, the organization that promotes the development of renewable energy sources in Pennsylvania.

Bettie Ann Brigham, vice president of student development, said that 950 Eastern students chose to pay the optional \$25 wind energy surcharge this semester. The Award, presented Oct. 16 at the Hilton Inn in Philadelphia, PA, is the culmination of a five-year plan to make the St. Davids campus fully wind-powered. According to Brigham, Eastern achieved that goal in just four years. She said, "Most parents and students feel good about our wind energy. It's a constant prayer of trying to be responsible with this beautiful environment that we have."

Eastern President David Black says, "Environmental stewardship is an essential component of the University's mission, and this wind

energy purchase is just the latest demonstration of our ongoing commitment. After considering the damaging effect of fossil fuels on the health of the globe and its people, our students have concluded thoughtfully that this ethical issue demands a response. These are the same students who choose to drink only coffee grown by those paid a living wage. And it's the same University whose economic development graduates have helped create more than a million jobs in the two-thirds world. Eastern students are never limited by geography, but take seriously our mission of social justice for the whole world."

## Russ Kehler '78 Helps Bring Clean Water to Nigeria

Teamwork is often what makes the difference between a project that is successful and one that never gets off the drawing board. This was the thought going through Russ Kehler's head in the summer of 2004, as he sat with the members of his Broomall, PA Rotary International Service Committee. The committee had just agreed to commit to what was initially a \$52,000 water purification project for the small village of Kwang, in central Nigeria. The village desperately needed a water purification plant for the new Haven of Hope Medical Clinic, and one of the club's members had friends who

only 2.5% of that is fresh water. Of the fresh water that we have, 99.7% is tied up in ice fields and glaciers. For millions of people around the world the water they do have access to is polluted by man, bacteria, viruses, or parasites. There are over one billion people in the world who do not have sufficient access to fresh, clean water. The villagers in Kwang are subject to

typhoid, giardia, and a particularly nasty wormlike parasite called bilharzias, which they can contract

> simply by splashing in the river. It has been estimated that as many as two thirds of the people in Nigeria are chronically ill

because of water borne parasites and diseases. Some estimate that 50% of the Nigerian children do not live past the age of five years.

Russ coordinated the donations from other Rotary Clubs and Rotary matching grants, while Stan organized the Rotarians into Saturday work crews. With over 100 Interactors from Marple Newtown High School participating, they passed out water bottles to their friends and families with instructions to fill the bottles with dollar bills every day for a month, so that others could have clean water. The

Saturday work crews took a 40-foot steel shipping container, lined it with plywood, ran plumbing and electrical lines, and installed a filtration system. Stan collected from Rotarians, local churches, and doctors, over \$50,000 worth of medical equipment, cots, and other items to add to the container for the medical clinic in Kwang Village, bringing the project total to over \$100,000.

On August 21, Stan sent Russ an e-mail explaining that the engineer they had sent to hook up the Kwang Village Water Filtration System had written, "All is working with the filter system!" Russ sighed with relief, knowing that it was three years of Rotary teamwork that was saving lives today in Nigeria and maybe bringing us all just a bit closer to peace in the world.

## Arts in Transformation

There is a movement in business and urban renewal that takes creativity very seriously. The national nonprofit arts and culture industry, called the Creative Economy, generates \$166.2 billion in economic activity every year. In Philadelphia, PA, a recent report indicated that the nonprofit arts produced "\$573 million and provided 14,000 jobs, along with another 17,000 volunteer positions."

However beautiful, intrinsically valuable and economically viable, the arts have a much deeper function in the lives of people in their struggles to learn, live, work, play and worship. To millions of functionally non-literate people around the world, and youth who are skipping the literate age through media technology, the creative arts commu-

nicate values, bring hope and healing in therapeutic ways, and educate and create a true sense of identity and community. And this is what I, and a growing group of artists, take very seriously in living out our faith through

compassionate service and "justice arts" outside the classroom.

## BuildaBridge in Philadelphia

Life-changing arts create a critical awareness in which individuals may understand their place in the world and a way out of their cir-

cumstance. Janelle Junkin, an Eastern University and Drexel University graduate now working as a music therapist in Philadelphia, interned in 2001 with BuildaBridge, a charitable nonprofit arts education and intervention organization I cofounded with Dr. Vivian Nix Early in 1997. Sometimes there is a dark side to this external expression of inner realities. For example, a young boy in a homeless shelter drew alarming pictures of setting a house on fire while brandishing a very large sword. Upon investigation, Janelle learned of the deep anger and resentment the young boy held for his grandmother who had basically kicked his family out on the streets. By bringing his inner reality to an external expression, Janelle was able to intervene in what could have been an even greater tragic circumstance when

we observed the need for creative approaches with family caregivers as well. Through research by some Eastern University graduate students, we confirmed that information is most often shared orally. One of the first people we met in this program was Chantelle (not her real name). She watched as her two boys, shy and apathetic at school, came alive and even improved their academic standing through our drama class. With a grant from American Express, and the help of a local banker and team of artists, we designed a financial literacy program called the Money News Network. Utilizing a game show and soap opera format, this "arts plus" curriculum taught basic concepts of budgeting, saving and banking. Chantelle eagerly participated. She now serves on our

In this beautiful facility, with graduate medical interns and professional artists as teachers, children studied biology and developed their artistic skills in local parks, culminating in an art show at a gallery.

### Touching the World

I am constantly reminded that while technology and higher education are a driving force in my life, there are still many people in the world who live where poverty and underdevelopment do not even merit a post office box.

For ten years we have been traveling the world providing training and direct service with volunteers. By 2010 we have set the goal to recruit 1000 artists who will commit their time and talents to artistic justice at home and around the world. This Artists on Call program includes scores of Eastern University students who have volunteered with us. BuildaBridge

is quickly approaching an annual budget of \$5 million. Many people are surprised that in ten years my co-founder and I have never taken a salary but volunteer our time. We are fortunate to be part of a University that encourages community service, and we have also been fortunate to be able to commit part of our salaries to support the work.

As the organization has grown, we have become scholar/practitioners, learning by experience about nonprofit management, development, social service, education, and many other disciplines. This experience informs my classroom teaching as part of the Eastern University Campolo School for Social Change. Since 2002, BuildaBridge has conducted an Institute for Arts and Transformation. Over 150 graduates from the U.S. and abroad have come to Philadelphia to share, learn, dream and plan for artistic justice in action. Last year BuildaBridge signed a partnership agreement with Eastern University to offer the coursework for a new MA in Urban Studies with an Arts

## **WORKING FOR SOCIAL JUSTICE**

BRYAN STEVENSON '81, an Eastern alumnus, has served and fought for over 20 years as a civil rights attorney, representing death row inmates in their pursuit of conviction reversals and it is with personal conviction and determination that he continues that

fight today. Stevenson runs a nonprofit law firm in Montgomery, Alabama called the Equal Justice Initiative, an organization he founded in 1985 that is dedicated to those who are unjustly facing death in our country's legal system.

His mission started after he graduated from Eastern with a degree in political science and philosophy and enrolled in Harvard Law School in 1981. His internship with the Southern Center for Human Rights served as a turning point in his life. Stevenson realized after reviewing cases devoid of legal justification that he could do something with his life as a death-penalty lawyer. he has successfully reversed the past two decades who were unfairly convicted of social status. Despite the long

hours and low or non-existent pay, he feels a sense of mission knowing that his work for those faced with


injustice and prejudice truly and literally saves lives. In addition to his time consuming legal work, he travels from Montgomery, Alabama to New York to teach three classes at the NYU School of Law concerning race and the criminal justice system. Presently, he hopes to broaden his focus by seeking sentence reversals for inmates

> who were punished for crimes they committed at 13 or 14 years old or for those convicted under the 3 strikes law.

Many wonder where his drive comes from or why he would want to represent those convicted of such terrible crimes. Stevenson often replies with a reference to the Bible in Matthew 25:40 in which it is believed that Jesus will say to the righteous in Heaven: "I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me." And still it is those he serves who know and believe in his purpose. Current client and inmate, Anthony Ray Hinton, writes in a letter from death row, " I felt this man went to law school for all the right reason. Here is a lawyer who knew his purpose as a man! If God create a (sic) better man, He keep him for His Self." It is because of clients like

Anthony that he remains a

dedicated and unwavering voice for those awaiting the ultimate punishment.

## Making a Difference

## **EASTERN FACULTY CONTRIBUTE TO NEW CHRISTIAN ENCYCLOPEDIA**

Several Eastern University faculty members were among those from around the globe invited to submit items for the upcoming *Encyclopedia of Christian* Civilization, including SLD chair DR. SHARON GRAMBY-SOBUKWE ("Mega Churches" and "African American Mega Churches") and Senior Vice President TOM RIDINGTON ("Sadhu Sundar Singh").

## FINDING UNTOLD STORIES

STAN LEQUIRE, instructional designer and adjunct professor, delivered a paper at the International Association for the Promotion of Christian Higher Education annual conference in Nicaragua, entitled "Globalizing Christian Education in Economic Development." LeQuire also presented a paper entitled, "Finding Untold Stories," a reflection on making sense of the tragic deaths of Christian field workers, at the Theological Society of South Africa in Pretoria.

Here is an abstract from Lequire's paper:

In 2003, gunmen stormed the home of José Matilde Bonilla and murdered him as he ate dinner with his family in the Honduran village of Palmital. For the gunmen, his crime was interference in their business while trying to assure clean water for his remote, impoverished village.

How are theologians and public servants to make sense of this story? Using principles of theological thinking, the Matilde narrative will be interpreted in the light of the *Judeo-Christian metanarrative. Then, it will be compared* to other stories of caring for the environment. One element of the Matilde story will stand out from the others – the context of the events is unusual enough to give the reader pause. The price paid by José Matilde Bonilla to care for creation is surprising to Western listeners. Customarily,

environmental stories are situated in far different contexts and do not usually resolve in this way. The case will be made that it is audience context which may even hinder the theologian from discovering this and similar stories.

*The story of Matilde – and perhaps others – risks being* undiscovered, forgotten, untold. Are there other such stories waiting for an audience? By a renewed commitment to disciplined observation, the theologian can make sure that he or she asks the right questions, thereby capturing valuable stories about the ways of God in the world and the actors in God's metanarrative. This article makes a proposal that inductive cross-contextual observation needs to be engaged by the theologian-storyteller.

## **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT**

Eastern University faculty members **ELOISE MENESES**, VAN WEIGEL and MIKE MTIKA who recently returned from Malawi, were conversing with the University of Livingstonia, a Christian college in northern Malawi, about preparing Christians to do development work in one of Africa's poorest nations. The many Eastern University alumni who populate Malawian NGOs, such as World Vision, Habitat for Humanity and Scripture Union, would teach in the joint program.

## **EVANGELISM**

Palmer Theological Seminary's AL TIZON, assistant professor of evangelism and holistic ministry, conducted an evangelism seminar at New College, Berkeley, CA. Some of the seminar's content has been adapted for an article to be published in Radix Magazine. In recent months Al has preached at churches in California, New York and Connecticut, usually on topics of special


interest to Evangelicals for Social Action and the Sider Center on Ministry and Public Policy, which operate under the Palmer/Eastern umbrella.

## **SOUTH AFRICAN RESIDENCY**

DR. SHARON GRAMBY-SOBUKWE reported on the recent South African residency, from which the following excerpts were extracted:

This year, proud students of Eastern University attended the School of Leadership and Development's third annual African Residency in Cape Town, South Africa at Stellenbosch University. Here SLD delivered a full complement of courses for three degrees, the MA in Organizational Leadership, the MA in International Development, and the MBA in Economic Development, to students in their first, second and third year of study.

Despite numerous visa and airline challenges, 51 Eastern University students and 15 faculty members joined us from around the world. Our



variety of development and mission organizations such as Samaritan's Purse, Tear Fund, World Relief, World Vision, USAID and Inter-varsity Christian Fellowship. Many are also pastors, some are missionaries and yet others are involved in a variety of local church ministries.

The majority of students are not U.S. citizens (59%), including 43% Africans. Of the 15 faculty who joined us 30% are Africans, and 27% females. In total, students, staff and faculty are nationals of 17 countries and work in 24 countries in Africa, Europe, Latin America, Asia and North America. Overall, our group represents Ethiopia, South Africa, United States, Canada, Indonesia, Guinea, Tanzania, Trinidad, Kenya, Uganda, Thailand, Nigeria, Liberia, Denmark, Zambia, Rwanda, Niger, Mozambique, Ghana, Malawi, Swaziland, Mexico, Botswana, Zimbabwe, Nepal, Costa Rica, Bangladesh, Philippines, England, El Salvador and Cameroon.

Our worship, study and fellowship were dynamic, spirit filled and blessed with multiple perspectives, diverse experiences and thus exponential learning from one another. We began each day in the Holy Spirit.

At the same time, the significance of our host site was not lost on us. While we held classes and our closing dinner in the room where the Dutch Reformed Church once decided to endorse apartheid, we were ever aware of social transformation as Stellenbosh University has joined other universities in diversifying faculty and students and recently appointed its first black University Rector (President).

*In the end, we are blessed to be a part of a mighty* move of God around the world. Through SLD's programs, Eastern University is equipping the people of God who live each day in service to those who suffer from disease, abandonment, war, poverty, and political corruption. They serve in every setting, urban and rural, large and small organizations, churches and NGOs. Yet, they all serve with not only the skills they learn from Eastern, such as project management, strategic thinking and micro-finance development, but most importantly, they serve in the spirit of Christ, intentionally modeling his

servanthood, stewardship and love. This is the whole gospel for the whole world. My prayer is that God will continue to richly bless all of us as we endeavor to follow him each day.

## STUDY OF SPEAKING IN TONGUES

Eastern's DR. JULIA STEWART and DR. WENDY STEINBERG, along with Drs. Feroze Mohamed and Scott Faro, Department of Radiology, Temple University, are studying the fMRI evidence for the linguistic nature of glossolalia, or speaking in tongues. Funded through a \$193,985 grant from the John Templeton Foundation, this study investigates the link between the reported spiritual phenomenon of glossolalia and physiological evidence for that phenomenon. Using functional Magnetic Resonance Imaging (fMRI), a research team including a linguist, a cognitive psychologist, a neuroradiologist and an MRI physicist will examine areas of the brain activated during glossolalia.

Analysis will be both descriptive and inferential. The objective of the study is to understand more fully the cognitive nature of this widespread phenomenon by applying rigorous scientific methods to an otherwise phenomenological experience.

BETH SETHI MBA '06 and Tammy Teske, both from Portland, OR, have established an online fair trade boutique, Bambootique, LLC (www.shopbambootique.com), which offers hip, unique accessories to its customers while providing income for poor women in developing countries. The women met while working for Medical Teams International. Through their international travels, they discovered women artisan cooperatives creating beautiful jewelry, handbags, candles, scarves and paper products. Teske is currently still employed by MTI, while Sethi now runs Bambootique from her home.

Bambootique's products include purses made by Indonesian women rebuilding their lives after the

tsunami in Banda Aceh, and eco-friendly Guatemalan candles which provide an alternate income to slash-andburn agriculture. One Nepalese woman who was abandoned by her husband is now able to provide food, a safe place to live, and an education for her two children because of her work making jewelry for one of Bambootique's artisan cooperatives. In an effort to provide greater economic opportunities for many women artisans, Sethi and Teske now import products from six cooperatives in Indonesia, Thailand, Cambodia, Guatemala, Honduras and Nepal.



On November 3, four Eastern University teams played for Pennsylvania Athletic Conference (PAC) Championships. Men's and Women's Soccer finished the fall with Conference Championships and trips to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

### Men's Soccer Earns Third Title

The men's soccer team earned their third PAC Title in the last five years. Five Eagles, led by senior Aaron Tritch and sophomore center back Mike Leitzel, earned All-PAC honors, and the team earned the inaugural PAC Team Sportsmanship Award. The award was designed to give student athletes a chance to honor opposing programs in the league that they felt represented the core values of sportsmanship.

Eastern Men's Soccer was the only Conference Champion selected to win the award. Coach Wagner said, "That we had the success we did and were honored with the team award means that the things we are trying to do with character development and spiritual formation are noticeable from the outside. We are not perfect in this, but we are very pleased to see our program honored."

After beating Misericordia 1-0 in the PAC Final, Mens Soccer continued their season into the second round of the NCAA tournament. The Eagles advanced past #10 Stevens Tech in a dramatic penalty kick shootout before falling to #9 York College in a heartbreaking double overtime game.

## Women's Soccer Enjoys Finest Season Ever

Women's Soccer downed Centenary College 1-0 to win their first PAC Title. Coach Mouw's team dominated regular season play in the PAC with a perfect 10-0 mark. Mouw earned PAC and the Southeast Pennsylvania Soccer Coaches Association Coach of the Year honors for the season.

Sophomore forward Jill DiRenzo set an Eastern singleseason record with 25 goals. DiRenzo,s consistency through

the year was remarkable as she scored in each of the Eagles' 12 games against conference opponents. She scored the game-winner fourteen minutes into the Conference Final to give the Eagles a chance to play in the NCAA Tournament for the first time in Program history. Ashley Hackman also played a major role in the Eagles' historic year. The midfielder from Perkasie, PA earned PAC Player of the Year honors while posting an astounding 21 assists and 12 goals. Hackman entered the year with 23 career assists and was one assist shy of the Eastern career mark. Her 13 assists in her second year had set the previous single-season standard. Only one player in Division III soccer recorded more assists in the year than the Eastern junior.

The Eastern attack scored a program-record 81 goals while surrendering just 16 in a 19-4 year. Coach Mouw said of his team's attacking success, "This year's team had the ability to put separation in games. This team was able to score goals in a lot of different ways. Jill and Ash had brilliant years, but whenever teams focused on them, our wide players showed the ability to create and finish chances." Kristin Watson and Nicole Grindle both scored 11 goals, and Chrissy West scored seven goals and picked up 10 assists despite missing considerable time with a hamstring injury.

In their first trip to the NCAA Tournament, the Eagles beat Salisbury University 1-0 on a third minute goal from DiRenzo. In the Regional final, the Eagles fell to an unbeaten and 3rd ranked side from the College of New Jersey. Junior outside backs Corie Brant and Kara Neef joined DiRenzo and Hackman on the All-PAC 1st team. Watson and West earned honorable mention from the league. Eastern goalkeeper Amanda Daveler finished the year ranked in the nation in goals against average and save percentage.

Volleyball and Field Hockey Reach Championship Game Again Eastern Volleyball and Field Hockey also reached the PAC Championship games to close the season. Volleyball entered the final as the ten-time defending PAC Champions and would play in their thirteenth consecutive PAC championship game. Eastern Head Coach Mark Birtwistle earned his 400th career win in Eastern's final regular season game of the year.

A strong effort by a good Neumann College team kept the Eagles from finishing their time in the PAC with a Championship. Emma Klein, Eastern's only senior, and the only player in Program history to amass more than 1400 digs and 1400 kills in her career, was honored as the PAC Player of the Year. Juniors Mandy Platt and Katie Ressler also earned All-PAC recognition.

Eastern Field Hockey, playing in their third straight PAC Title Match, fell just short of defending as PAC Champions in their game against Alvernia College.

After a 2-2 regulation and a half-hour of scoreless overtime hockey, the PAC Championship was determined in strokes. Alvernia finally earned the win on the 11th shooter. The Eagles nonetheless enjoyed a strong season with big nonconference wins over a nationally ranked Montclair State team and a win at Kenyon College on their way to a 15-6 fall. Lindsay Moyer, Kim Campbell and Katie Maguire each earned first team All-PAC honors, and seniors Jaimie Heck and Stephanie Moyer earned 2nd team recognition.

## Cross Country Makes Great Strides in Year Three

One week before Championship Saturday, the Eastern University Cross Country team made a big step forward at the PAC Championships. In just their third year as a program, both the men's and women's teams finished fifth in the Championship race. Mike Wilson finished third and Ben O'Donnell finished 12th to earn All-PAC recognition for the men. Head Coach Eric Mundy expressed his pleasure with the growth of the team to its largest number of competitors ever. He said, "We now have a great young group of runners to build on. Our athletes are competitive and fun to be around, and we feel that the program will continue to grow and get stronger."

A successful fall generates momentum toward an exciting year of basketball and for the future as Eastern begins competition in the MAC in 2008-09.
