FACULTY SPOTLIGHT - MELANIE RODRIGUEZ

Professor Melanie Rodriguez has taken on two important roles in the School of Nursing including that of ATI Champion (ATI is an online NCLEX RN preparation tool) and Academic Success Coach. As ATI Champion, she is responsible for student and faculty training related to the integration of the content and the analysis of outcomes. With Professor Rodriguez' leadership, the School of Nursing has made extensive advancements in the use of ATI and the data it provides. ATI is one of several innovative resources in place to support student success throughout the program and in testing for RN licensure.

The ATI Champion role aligns perfectly with Professor Rodriguez' other role as the Academic Success Coach. The Academic Success Coach is a new resource offered to all nursing students. Following an individualized needs assessment, the coach provides

academic support and guidance on topics such as test taking strategies, study skills, stress management, self-care and accessing campus resources. Professor Rodriguez' clinical background in behavioral health is an additional asset to these roles. Professor Rodriguez received the College of Health and Science Faculty of the Month award for December as recognition for her work in these areas.
