Campus Resources

Housing

Emergency Care After Hours

Off Campus Resources

Housing

If you need assistance with housing off campus in the Radnor area, start by Contacting PA 211:

- Dial or Text: Call 211 or text your zip code (19087 for Radnor) to 898-211.
- Get Connected: You'll be connected with a trained specialist who can provide information and referrals to housing assistance programs and other support services in your community.

There are also several programs available to help with off campus housing:

- Housing Choice Voucher Program: This program, formerly known as Section 8, provides rental assistance to low-income families in the private rental market. You apply through a <u>Public Housing Authority</u> (PHA).
- Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP): Available through the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, this program can help with rent, utilities, and

other housing-related costs if you're facing eviction or a housing crisis. Contact your local <u>County Assistance Office (CAO)</u> for this and the <u>Emergency Shelter</u> Allowance.

- Homeless Assistance Program (HAP): This program helps prevent homelessness and assists those who are homeless or at risk of losing their housing. You apply through your county's HAP provider.
- First-Time Homebuyer Programs: If you're looking to buy a home, the <u>Housing</u>
 <u>Partnership of Chester County</u> offers financial assistance, counseling, and training for low- and moderate-income individuals.

Food

Eagle's Essentials (on-campus food pantry)

Eagle's Essentials provides resources, such as shelf-stable foods, hygiene products, and frozen meals, to alleviate food insecurity, improvise long-term health and eating habits, ensure allergies are recognized and addressed, and promote sustainability on campus.

Wayne Cares Food Pantry

- Location: Serving the Radnor Township area.
- Services: Offers supplemental groceries, dairy products, eggs, and frozen meats.
- Distribution: Wednesday mornings 9 AM 1 PM, and Wednesday evenings 5 PM
 6:30 PM.

- **Special Offerings:** Provides hygiene products, cleaning products, and fresh produce on specific Wednesdays.

Food Stamps

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) helps Pennsylvanians buy food. People in eligible low-income households can obtain more nutritious diets with SNAP increasing their food purchasing power at grocery stores and supermarkets. Those who are eligible receive an Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) ACCESS Card to make food purchases. Experiencing a food emergency and need food right away? Help is available. Visit the PA Department of Human Services website to see if you qualify and to apply.

Health Insurance

Pennsylvania offers several programs to provide free or low-cost health insurance to eligible residents.

Medicaid:

- Provides comprehensive medical coverage to low-income individuals and families.
- Eligibility is based on income and household size.
- To apply, visit the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services website (https://www.compass.state.pa.us/).

Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP):

- Provides health insurance for children from families with moderate incomes who do not qualify for Medicaid.
- Eligibility is based on income and household size.
- To apply, visit the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services website or call 1-800-986-KIDS (5437).

Pennie:

- Pennsylvania's health insurance marketplace.
- Offers affordable health insurance plans to individuals and families who are not eligible for Medicaid or CHIP.
- To apply, visit the Pennie website (https://pennie.com/).

Other Programs:

- Some employers may offer health insurance as part of their benefits package.
- Some non-profit organizations may provide health assistance programs.

To qualify for any of these programs, you must:

- Be a Pennsylvania resident
- Be a U.S. citizen, national, or have qualified immigration status
- Meet income eligibility requirements
