




Using the front of the library as a place to pet animals does not create focused and academic mindsets. I know some these things are out of your control, but libraries need to be the mental and physical foci of learning.
- I would *love* if our library could subscribe to an excellent on-line dictionary (like the on-line Oxford English Dictionary). I often use on-line dictionaries, but I'd like to be able to use a more reputable, more thorough dictionary. Perhaps Eastern does have some good alternatives, but, if so, I do not find them easily identifiable or accessible. -- Also, kudos to you on your excellent ILL and EZ Borrow services. You are fantastic with these! -- In general, I am just so very impressed with what you are able to do with so few resources. You are a dedicated, committed, and great group of librarians! Thank you!

- Consider looking at the textbook lists and notifying faculty if required or recommended texts are available to students online. Also consider having a location online where students can buy/sell textbooks.
- The library hours need to be extended during the summer both for faculty and for summer undergraduate and graduate students.
