It is with great pleasure that I write this because of all the exciting happenings in the School of Nursing. Despite a change of leadership in the Fall of 2023, the amazing faculty and staff have worked tirelessly and joyfully to make a seamless transition for the students. This newsletter provides you with a snapshot of the many accomplishments within the school this past year.

In the Fall the BSN program extended open arms to transfer nursing students from neighboring Cabrini; three sophomores, ten juniors, and six seniors. Extensive evaluations of their course work were completed and adjustments made in order for them to smoothly integrate into our curricular program. The seniors are preparing for graduation and we are so pleased to be a part of their education.

The School of Nursing is exploring additional programs to offer at the Masters level in addition to the current Master of Science in Nursing: Nurse Educator program. Offered on-line, it accommodates adult learning and scheduling. A discount is offered for alumni who enroll in the Fall of 2024. The program will also be seeking re-accreditation by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) in Fall Of 2025 and is already starting work towards that end.

The school nurse program is thriving, and offers quality on-line education programs in the Certified School Nurse (CSN), M.Ed in School Health Services Degree, and School Health Supervisory certification tracks. We are pleased to announce that one of our alumni has been named School Nurse of the year. School Nurse of the Year. A vision we have is to transition the M.Ed degree to an MSN degree for students. As Spring is upon us, it reminds us of new growth and hope for things to come. The School of Nursing is looking forward to celebrating what the Lord has in store for us in the future.

The scope of the program includes a certification for School Nurse (CSN), for School Health Supervisor, and a Masters in Education in School Health Services.

Professor Trask worked full time at North Schuylkill School District in Ashland, and now keeps current by substituting there as needed. She is finishing her terminal degree this year. She will finish her DNP program degree on June 25, 2024, and officially graduates in October 2024.


WELCOME EVA RAGWAN, PHD

SPIRITUAL ASSESSMENT INTEGRATION



Professor Marziano was pleased to welcome guest lecturer, Reverend Casey Adel Bien-Aime, Endowed Chair of Pastoral Care at Lankenau Medical Center, to speak to her Introduction to Professional Holistic Nursing classes regarding how to perform a spiritual assessment with their patients.

Topics included cultural competence, cultural humility, and cultural sensitivity.

Rev. Bien-Aime is a Doctor of Ministry student at Palmer Theological Seminary.

The Reverend also engaged the class in discussions on the different spiritual assessment models including:

- Faith/belief, Importance, Community, Address in Care (FICA)
- Hope, Organized religion, Personal spirituality and practices, and Effects on medical care and end-oflife issues (HOPE)
- Faith (beliefs), Active, Comfort, conflicts, and Treatment plan (FACT)
- Spiritual belief system, Personal spirituality, Integration with a spiritual community, Ritualized
 practices and restrictions, Implications for medical practice, and Terminal events planning (SPIRIT)
